PIONEER BAND GALA & AUCTION IS ALMOST UPON US! We are excited to present our annual spectacular, "The Pioneer Band Gala & Auction" on Sunday, February 12, 2006, at the Four Points Sheraton. CHAIR AUDITIONS for each band are ongoing and you should hear the sound of *wood shedding* (an ancient term for practicing) in the house. If you don't, please *gently encourage* your child to be prepared for auditions. The Pioneer Bands only have one chair audition per year, and we don't use the "challenge system". Band Placement auditions for the 2006-07 school year take place in the early spring (probably on or around mid March-2006).

DISTRICT SOLO & ENSEMBLE — JANUARY 28TH Members of Symphony Band and Concert Band are *required* to participate in Solo & Ensemble. Members of Varsity Band are *strongly encouraged* to participate in Solo & Ensemble, as this makes a great practice run to prepare to audition for one of the other bands at Pioneer. Organized by PBA Past President Daryl Hurst, 18 students were members of an historic photo taken on the steps of Old Ann Arbor High School to mimic a historic photograph taken of the very first Ann Arbor High School Band in 1914. This new picture will then be used in feature articles and displays about The Centennial Project, and Hurst hopes to track the students as they progress through their instrumental career, culminating in the students participation in the centennial year celebration when they are seniors.

MSBOA DISTRICT XII SOLO & ENSEMBLE FESTIVAL INFORMATION Saturday, January 28, 2005

WHERE IS IT? Hosted by Livonia Franklin High School, the MSBOA District XII event allows participants to perform before an adjudicator either as part of an ensemble or as a soloist. Events receive ratings from *I* - *V*, with *I* being the best. Each event receives written comments from the adjudicator, and often receives a mini-clinic. Medals are awarded to events which receive *I* or *II* ratings.

WHO GOES? Pioneer Symphony Band and Concert Band students are REQUIRED to participate in District Solo & Ensemble Festival. Varsity Band members are *strongly encouraged* to participate. Solo & Ensemble Festival is a very important part of the bands curriculum at Pioneer.

WHAT MUSIC? Mr. Leach has a great deal of ensemble music available (just ask), while solo pieces can be chosen with the help of your private teacher. Students are encouraged to put together duets, trios, quartets, and quintets. Mr. Leach is often available after 7th hour to guide and encourage these small ensembles. *Soloists and Ensembles should be aware that their music must be prepared and practiced OUTSIDE OF THE REGULAR CLASSROOM*.

DO I NEED AN ACCOMPANIST?

All events *must* be accompanied if an accompaniment is written, or no rating will be given. Students needing accompanists should contact an accompanist NOW. Anyone may act as an accompanist. Fees for accompanists vary widely — make sure you know how much your accompanist charges. Some have one fee for rehearsals and performance, others are paid each time you meet. Recorded or electric (i.e. synthesized accompaniments) are not allowed. Piano solos with orchestral accompaniment must be performed without that accompaniment.

HOW MANY EVENTS? Each student is limited to *three events*. Make sure you know your performance and warm-up room numbers. All events will be called from the warm-up room approximately 30 minutes before their scheduled playing time.

WHEN DO I PLAY? Mr. Leach will notify students when and where their event(s) are scheduled about 10 days before the District Festival. It is the student's responsibility to get to Livonia Franklin High School well in advance of his/her earliest performance time. Arrival at least one hour before the earliest scheduled warm up time is HIGHLY encouraged.

WHAT ARE THE RULES? Students may perform in three events. The minimum time allowed for each event is two minutes, maximum six minutes. Repeats, D.C.s or D.S.s may NOT be added to the music to meet the minimum time requirements.

Each soloist or ensemble must provide the judge with an ORIGINAL score (<u>NOT A</u> <u>PHOTOCOPY</u>) with each measure numbered, or no rating will be given. If a full score is not published, a condensed score will be accepted. If no score is published, it is the responsibility of the event to make one. See Mr. Leach for clarification.

WHAT HAPPENS IF I GET A 1ST DIVISION RATING AT DISTRICT?

Students receiving a *I* Rating at the DISTRICT 12 Solo & Ensemble Festival may register for STATE Solo & Ensemble Festival, held each March at seven different sites across the state of Michigan. This year's date is MARCH 25, 2005 (*Please note that State Festival takes place THE SAME SATURDAY AS OUR BANDS IN REVIEW CONCERT*). 10th through 12th grade soloists are required to take a Proficiency Examination, with scales and sight reading, at State Festival. State Festival Registration materials are

available to those who qualify after District S&E Festival from Mr. Leach.

Soloists and members of Traditional Ensembles (e.g. woodwind and brass quintet) who excel at the State Festival level are often invited to perform at the Michigan Youth Arts Festival (MYAF) held each May at Western Michigan University. Only 250 out of the more than 80,000 instrumental music students who participate at the district level across the state will be part of the MYAF Honors Band or Orchestra, and Pioneer High School sends a large percentage of MYAF members each year. The very highest level soloists are recommended by their State Festival adjudicators to audition to be one of five soloists to play with orchestral accompaniment at the MYAF. These soloists are required to play a concerto at State Festival, as orchestral accompaniment is required.

The Pioneer Jazz Band Concert is January 18th, and the first Varsity, Concert & Symphony Band performance is on February 2nd. Symphony Band, Concert Band and Varsity Band

concert uniforms consist of black tuxedos (with bow tie) for men and black dresses for women.

Our students have truly captured the attention of many music lovers at home and abroad and have received many accolades. As we continue to strive for excellence, we are thankful to all of you for your past and continued support.

We encourage you to use your collective family imagination, inspiration and flair when coming up with a theme. But, if you are having difficulty, here are a few suggestions and ideas for themes that have been used and items that may be included in the packages:
