MSBOA Band Festival



First up, we have the MSBOA Band Festival. This is like the MSBOA Solo and Ensemble Festival which most of your kids took part in last January, except that it involves adjudicated performances of the entire band, not just onsies and twosies. Held on Saturday 2/28/15 this year, at Pioneer, it really is something worth attending – ESPECIALLY the sight-reading part which follows the main performance part. This is where the bands and the Director are presented with a score they've never seen before, and between the lot of them, they turn it into something that sounds absolutely fantastic. Me, I have a hard time sight-reading Harry Potter. I also don't think I could get 50 of my friends to even clap in unison without sounding like a typing pool. But these kids, under the direction of Mr. Leach, can cold-start a full-on performance piece in near-perfect sync with nary a missed beat.
